



United States v. Fulton

In May 2019, DCFS and Law Enforcement opened investigations

Investigation revealed that mistakes were made, and the system had failed the children multiple times.

When his sentence is served, Fulton will be on supervised release for life. He also was ordered to make restitution to the victims - \$342,200 each to the sisters and \$295,400 to the brother.

Fulton also must report as a sex offender to whichever registry is appropriate upon his release.



Victims speak

The first victim began her statement again, saying Fulton wasn't going to admit to what he did but that he was guilty whether he liked it or not.

She recalled bandaging the wounds Fulton had given her younger siblings and watching her brother's skin peel when he poured microwaved water on him.



"I know what he did wasn't right," she said.

She also spoke about their mother, how she struggles because she didn't protect them. And she said when their situation was reported to child services officials, caseworkers interviewed her with Fulton present — and she wasn't able to tell them what was happening.

The next victim's statement was read into the record. She said she sometimes wishes she'd never met Fulton, but is grateful for the younger siblings he and her mother gave her.

Their mother — now a nurse — carries on, even though she's paranoid Fulton or his family will hurt them. She said there is no leader in their family now, that they make decisions together.

What they've accomplished isn't because of Fulton, but in spite of him, she said. She told Fulton that she hates him and everything he put them through. No punishment is fair enough, she said.



FY24 OVC ECM solicitation

- Both federally recognized tribes AND tribal organizations (other than Fed recog tribes) are eligible, and
- Language encouraging tribes to apply and/or be included as key partners.


OVC encourages Tribal applicants to apply as task force lead applicants or, where appropriate, encourages ECM task force applicants in jurisdictions with Tribal communities to include American Indian or Alaska Native participation in their ECM task forces.

OVC began funding trafficking victim service providers under the Services for Victims of Human Trafficking Program in 2003. OVC is now the largest federal funder of services for human trafficking victims in the United States.



CASE STUDY

Montgomery PD - Special Ops Unit

Convinced he's a drug dealer so target him as one.







- Bounces between hotels in a 2-mile area
- Different vehicle each time with a female driver
- Never caught with more than user amount
- Rumors:
 - Has "stable" of 5 regular girls and others to whom he sold drugs.
- No one will say a bad word against him



Narrow investigation

- MPD didn't adjust from their initial assessment of target at as "drug dealer."
- MPD din't share info with other agencies or ask for help.
- 3 years of investigation with nothing to show for it.





Meanwhile...

Montgomery County Sheriff's Office

"He's affiliated with a gang..."





1st: Met target at 15 years old, being trafficking by her mom, drug user.

2nd: Being trafficking by rival pimp, addicted to heroin.

- 3rd: Romantic relationship ended, just released from jail, homeless, drug addiction.
- 4th: Drug addiction, lost custody of child, no family support

5th: Addicted to meth, no family support, lost custody of children, romantic relationship ended, homeless.



60 years in prison Restitution = almost a million dollars
